

Application to vote by emergency proxy based on imprisonment in Scotland

Voting by proxy

Proxy voting means that if you aren't able to cast your vote in person, you can have someone you trust cast your vote for you.

This form is designed for use if **you cannot vote in person at your polling station because of your detention in prison** and you are applying to vote by proxy (someone else voting on your behalf) in a particular election.

You can apply until **5pm on the day of the poll**.

You must have been living in Scotland before your prison sentence and be serving a term of imprisonment of 12 months or less.

You will be eligible to vote in local council elections and Scottish Parliament elections. You cannot vote in elections to the UK Parliament. Both you and your proxy must be registered and eligible to vote.

A person can only be a proxy for close relatives and up to two other people at an election.

Close relatives are the spouse, civil partner, parent, grandparent, brother, sister, child or grandchild of the applicant.

Another prisoner cannot be your proxy if they are also detained in prison on the date of the poll.

How do I apply to vote by proxy?

- You must ask someone who is willing and capable to be your proxy and vote on your behalf.
- Fill in the emergency proxy vote application form.
- Make sure all sections of the form are complete. You need to give your date of birth and signature on this application form. This information is needed to prevent fraud. If you are unable to sign this form, please contact your elections team at your local electoral registration office.
- Return your form to the local electoral registration office for the address that you are registered to vote at. You can find their contact details and pre-paid addressed envelopes in the prison library.

Please do not return your form to the Electoral Commission.

This form must arrive at your electoral registration office **before 5pm on the day of the poll**.

You must already be registered to vote before applying for a proxy vote or emergency proxy vote. The deadline to register to vote is **midnight, 12 working days before the poll**. Register to vote online at gov.uk/register-to-vote.

This form and these deadlines only apply in Scotland.

What happens after I've returned this form?

- Your proxy must go to your polling station to vote.
- You should tell your proxy how you want them to vote on your behalf, for example, which candidates and parties.
- The elections team at your council will tell your proxy when and where to vote on your behalf.

Privacy statement

We collect information under the legal basis of a task carried out in the public interest, as set out in the Representation of the People Act 1983 and related regulations. We will look after personal information securely and follow data protection legislation.

If you opted-out of the open register we will only use the information you give us for electoral purposes, including matching it against other sources of data to support the electoral register. We will not give personal information to anyone else, unless we have to by law. The law requires us to share your information with candidates, political parties and campaigners for democratic engagement purposes and credit reference agencies to check your identity when you apply for credit.

If you have not opted-out of the open register your name and address can be bought by anyone and used for lots of purposes, including direct marketing.
