Application to change an existing proxy at a Scottish council election

Voting by proxy

Proxy voting means that if you aren't able to cast your vote in person, you can have someone you trust cast your vote for you.

You can use this form to replace an existing proxy for a Scottish council election if they are unable to vote at the polling station on your behalf.

Both you and your proxy must be registered and eligible to vote.

A person can only be a proxy for close relatives and up to two other people at an election or referendum. Close relatives are the spouse, civil partner, parent, grandparent, brother, sister, child or grandchild of the applicant.

How do I apply to change my proxy?

- To change your proxy, you must have an existing proxy arrangement. If your existing proxy is unable to vote on your behalf, you can use this form to change your proxy.
- You must ask someone who is willing and capable to be your replacement proxy and vote on your behalf.
- Fill in the proxy vote application form. You must give a reason why your existing proxy is unable to vote in person on your behalf.
- Make sure you complete all sections of the form and supply your date of birth and signature. You need to give your date of birth and signature on this application form. This information is needed to prevent fraud. If you are unable to sign this form, please contact your local electoral registration office.
- Return your form to your electoral registration office. You can find their details and more information at electoralcommission.org.uk/voter.

Please do not return your form to the Electoral Commission.

You can apply to change your proxy until 5pm on the day of the poll.

If you have a long-term proxy arrangement, your new proxy will remain appointed for future elections unless you apply again to change or cancel your proxy.

You cannot change an existing proxy who is voting by post on your behalf.

You must already be registered to vote, before applying for a proxy vote or to replace a proxy. The deadline to register to vote is **midnight**, **12 working days before the poll**. Register to vote online at **gov.uk/register-to-vote**.

What happens after I've returned this form?

- Your new proxy must go to your polling station to vote.
- Your electoral registration office will tell your proxy when and where to vote on your behalf.
- You should let your proxy know how you want them to vote on your behalf, for example, which candidate, party, or outcome.
- If it turns out that you are able to go to the polling station on polling day, you can vote in person as long as your proxy has not already done so, or has not applied to vote for you by post.

Privacy statement

We collect information under the legal basis of a task carried out in the public interest, as set out in the Representation of the People Act 1983 and related regulations. We will look after personal information securely and follow data protection legislation.

If you opted-out of the open register we will only use the information you give us for electoral purposes, including matching it against other sources of data to support the electoral register. We will not give personal information to anyone else, unless we have to by law. The law requires us to share your information with candidates, political parties and campaigners for democratic engagement purposes and credit reference agencies to check your identity when you apply for credit.

If you have <u>not</u> opted-out of the open register your name and address can be bought by anyone and used for lots of purposes, including direct marketing.
